## TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2025

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31st March 2025. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

Legal and administrative information set out on the information page forms part of this report.

### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### Objectives and aims

The objectives of the charity are to promote the conservation and preservation of archives for the benefit of the public and to advance public education on matters connected with archives. The archives include records reflecting the history, life, economy and activities of Hampshire and its people whatever their media, including photographs, film, tape and machine readable records as well as traditional materials such as paper and parchment.

#### **Public benefit**

The Trustees confirm that they have taken account of the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit. The benefits that arise from the aims of Hampshire Archives Trust (HAT) are the conservation, preservation and education of the public on Hampshire life as described in the objectives above. In addition the grant programme supports others delivering on projects aligned with Hampshire Archive Trust's aims.

### TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2025

#### ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

#### Charitable activities

The Trustees met four times during the year for Board meetings. In addition a number of sub committees were created for specific purposes, meeting on some ten further occasions. All except one meeting were held on zoom:

- grants panel
- website; development and performance
- considering and planning new project around community archives held by Local History Groups in terms of access and availability

There has been a great emphasis over the last 3-4 years to reshaping the Trust to ensure it is better equipped to fulfil its objectives and deliver public benefit. This, together with sustaining an efficient and effective trust, will be a constant objective and work in 2024-2025 has included:

- continuation of a project to encourage younger members based around a local history competition;
- The Trust hosted a stall for Heritage Open Days in Sep. 2024 to promote archives and the work of the Trust;
- Looking for ways to reduce the cost of producing the printed newsletter.

#### **HAT Annual General Meeting 12 October 2024**

At this meeting at the Arc Winchester, the re-election of 3 Trustees was agreed unanimously by the members, and agreed the election of Bishop Philip as Vice President. Presentations were heard about selected grants featuring:

- a talk about the HAT grant funded project 'Unlocking Hampshire's Musical Heritage' by Stephen Rose https://hampshirearchivestrust.co.uk/news/hampshire-archives-trust-grants/unlocking-hampshires-west-gallery-music with a short performance by The Madding Crowd band of 'unlocked music' from one of the digitised manuscripts;
- Sarah Lewin (HRO) then gave an overview of the finds in the 'Basingstoke has history too' cataloguing project;
- David Spurling (HAT trustee) gave a short talk on the survey project that HAT conducted in August and set out the purpose of the survey and how it is intended to be used in providing guidance for local history groups in digitising their archives and making them available online.

#### New projects

Technology offers the potential to move the management and accessibility of community archives onto another level. HAT has received a number of requests for grants to help with this, but the overall picture is anecdotal. The survey project is designed to establish just how owners of community archives are meeting the challenge.

HAT spent the latter part of 2023-24 preparing and designing a survey of local history groups to see just what the position is. The survey took place in 2024-25, and reported October 2024 with its findings shared at the AGM, and articles in the newsletter.

### Digital Performance

## Website annual performance summary 2024-25 - what the figures tell us

- The annual snapshot of website users show a 284%(102,000 user visits) increases in new users and a 317% (to 23,433) increase on visits to the site.
- Most come to our website via google or similar search rather than straight to us.
- The home page has our survey and stories from the archives within it.
- Event bookings and payment for them are up through the website are up, but this is the first full year of offering this option, and some difficulties are still tripping users up.
- Payments through the site for membership are slightly up and again some problems with payments have occurred.

#### Social media activity including podcasts and webinars

This provides an active and engaging programme during the autumn winter and spring. In 2024-25 HAT hosted 4 live webinars with an audience together of 117, and 10 podcasts which can be downloaded at any time, and 10 blogs. Webinars featured talks on:

- King Charles I and Queen Henrietta heritage sites in Hampshire;
- Mary I and Philip of Spain in Winchester;

- Winchester Jewry Revisited;
- Jane Austen and the Magazines.

Social media activity showed 196 posts with 889 followers on facebook, 60 posts with 284 followers on Instagram, 261 posts and 1039 followers on X (the growth has slowed here as some followers have stopped using the platform) and in November 2024 HAT also signed up to Bluesky.

#### Newsletters

HAT has also produced and circulated to all members 2 editions of the printed newsletter and 2 editions of the e chat newsletter, the printed newsletter was delayed due to illness.

#### **Publicity**

HAT has had reduced impact on media but continues to publicise its activities through outreach and its website, especially about grants awarded, its grants programme and the schools competition.

The Board set maximum value of grants in 2024-25 to £20,000 based on amounts awarded since 2019 and reduced level of income for the Trust.

There were 14 Grants awarded in 2024 to 2025 together amounting to £12,595.88; main grants are decided in July and January and successful projects appear on the HAT website https://hampshirearchivestrust.co.uk/grants and in the HAT newsletter.

## **Schools Competition**

2024-25 saw a range of topics covered and projects submitted in different formats: PowerPoints, essays, posters, and display boards. Some of this year's topics included: the history of the students' school, the Roman villa at Sparsholt, 'the Secret Life of Henry Perin', the History of Fair Oak, the Titanic, Wickham Fair, the Chesapeake Mill, and an organised 'War Walk' of surviving WWII buildings of RAF Ibsley which involved producing a booklet and creating an exhibition to give further information to the Walkers.

The winning trophy for group entry years 7-9 went to Wyvern College, the winning student at Perins School and the winning student at Toynbee School won the individuals award. ### Statutory declaration

#### Other support for archives

The Trust offers continued support for Hampshire's archives services (especially as a key stakeholder of HRO) both in general and as grant awarding body.

The Trust continues support of archive preservation by directing potential depositors, either approaching via the website or in person, to appropriate Hampshire repositories and through its grant programmes

The Trust supports VCH activity - opening up the county's archives; volunteer engagement with research; publishing; fundraising; etc.

The Trust offers volunteer opportunities for example in the preparation of its newsletter, videoing and content for its new social media venture and support on visits.

### FINANCIAL REVIEW

### **Financial position**

At 31st March 2025 the fund balance was £182,872 of which £57,825 was unrestricted.

#### **Principal funding sources**

The charity's principal sources of funds are detailed in the final accounts but in brief are

- subscriptions
- investments
- Charlotte Bonham Carter endowment, a rescue fund

#### **Investment policy and objectives**

The Trustees may invest any money not immediately required in such investments as they think fit.

#### Reserves policy

The Trust's reserves policy directs contingency reserves would be based on 25% of its annual expenditure to provide for regular fluctuations in income and expenditure as well as a contingency for unforeseen events.

The charity developed an amended policy on reserves during 2023-24 approved at Trustees' meeting October 2023 this remains unchanged.

The charity will review annually (July) the amount set aside for grant awards to ensure that the level is sustainable and set a limit of £20,000 for 2024-25 at its meeting July 2024.

The charity is unincorporated and its powers are set out in its Constitution.

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2025

#### 1. STATUTORY INFORMATION

The Hampshire Archives Trust is a charity registered in England and Wales. The charity's registered number and registered address can be found in the Trustees' Report.

### 2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### **Accounting conventions**

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, with the exception of investments which are included at market value, as modified by the revaluation of certain assets.

The financial statements have been prepared to give a 'true and fair' view and have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a 'true and fair' view. This departure has involved following Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued in October 2019 rather than the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice effective from 1 April 2005 which has since been removed.

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

#### **Expenditure**

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Website - 20% on cost

#### **Stocks**

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

#### **Taxation**

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

#### **Fund accounting**

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.
